At a time when the majority of news out of Africa is bad-the Ebola crisis, kidnappings of children, and rampant terrorism come to one's mind easily, I am pleased to report that recently I witnessed some amazing "good news" in South Sudan. Through the efforts of Fred and Libby Dearing and their staff who steward important covenants with Holston Conference districts, the renewed short-term mission trips such as the one I experienced in August is bringing hope to the South Sudanese people. They know that they are loved, supported and important to not only the Holston Conference but the Lord as well.

Our 14 day trip from Knoxville to Yei took our team through many dusty dirt roads into the surrounding villages around Yei. We met young children who were terrified of the "Kwaja" (this is a non-racist term that literally means white man) and many, many people who, in spite of the daily hardships of living in a third world country, greeted our team with smiles, love and laughter. While most of South Sudan has been in an unsettling political unrest, thankfully Yei holds to the peace and stability that has allowed the Holston Conference efforts to continue providing education, clean water and a loving home to some of the world's poorest of the poor. The team witnessed many significant acts of hope, faith and love through the lives of a people long persecuted by Sudanese Arabs. They are learning to live in the world's newest country in peace and solidarity and the presence of the Holston Conference is a big part of their new life of peace.

With 32 bore holes dug by the Holston Conference many families and individuals in the surrounding villages have enjoyed clean water and disease-free living for several years; however, the Foundation and the Dearings know that existing bore holes are in need of ongoing maintenance as parts wear out and chlorine tablets need to be replaced. WHEN IS THE BEST TIME TO HAVE A GIFT ACCEPTANCE POLICY? NOW.

Before your church receives estate gifts, stock gifts, real estate or other appreciated assets, deferred or otherwise, THE CHURCH SHOULD HAVE A POLICY IN PLACE TO ACCEPT THE GIFT. Often churches want to promote planned giving in their church (being in an individual's estate plan for example), but do not take the time to communicate that a gift from a will or trust would be stewarded well. A Gift Acceptance Policy is designed to assure that all gifts to the Church, or for the use of the Church, are structured to provide maximum benefit to both parties.
