

Across the conference many churches are invested in CDs for short and even long-term investments. With interest rates still very low and inflation a real concern funds used for maintenance, missions and outreach or simply a rainy day are losing their purchasing power. For many church committees "business as usual" is a comfortable approach to handling the resources given to them.

Often when we meet with committees we discuss the Parable of the Talents found in Matthew 25:14. In this parable Jesus tells of the Master who, before leaving for a journey, entrusted to three servants large sums of money. Of ther three servants one feared the possibility of displeasing his master so he buried it in the ground, essentially washing his hands of the responsibility of being a good steward of his Master's resources. He actually told his Master when he returned and chastised him that he "knew him to be a hard man!" (If the Master represents God that is a whole 'nother topic...)

Bankrate.com's recent publishing of CD rates shows the average 1-year CD yield is .3%. The Holston Conference Foundation's Balanced Growth Fund is up 6.47% as of 7/31/16. Our Short-Term Fund is up 2.04%. Both numbers translate into greater ministry for your church or organization and in essence being the servant that the Master may say
