**Abingdon:** In February, the combined youth groups of Wharf Hill and Sugar Grove UMC planned a Valentine spaghetti dinner to raise money for St. Jude Children's Research Hospital in Memphis. "What was not anticipated was the 10 inches of snow that began earlier in the day and continued throughout the next day," says the Rev. Mike Ward. The youth decided to go on with the dinner, delivering take-outs to the community. With the help of adult volunteers, the youth raised \$838. All of the supplies and food were donated by church members.

**Big Stone Gap:** After the April 16 Virginia Tech shooting, members at Rye Cove UMC felt called to respond. They made ribbons in Hokie colors and asked the Rye Cove schools to observe Orange and Maroon Day on April 19. The ribbons were distributed to students and teachers, and "the schools were overflowing with Virginia Tech colors," reports Brenda Dishner. Prior to a moment of silence at the high school, a Rye Cove UMC youth member, Brady Palmer, read Matthew 5:4 over the loud speaker.

Chattanooga: Forty-five years ago, Jim Bowen started the first Boy Scout troop at New Salem UMC. He's been leading Troop 29 ever since. In February on Scout Sunday, Bowen was honored with a special award for 50 years of scouting, which

includes five years as a Boy Scout himself. Bowen's award and many years of service were featured on the local NBC station, says Pastor Paul Longmire.
