Abingdon:

An Emory & Henry college senior has been named to the USA Today All-USA College Academic Team. Big Stone Gap:

Midway Memorial's food program for the needy in Scott County is serving as many 181 households each month, up from 16 households when it debuted in November 2000. "We never advertised, but through word of mouth, people started coming," the Rev. Don Large reports. With the help of Second Harvest, members get food in bulk and box up supplies, handing them out one day each month. Sometimes people begin waiting in line two hours before the church opens. "On cold days, we open up the fel-

lowship hall and have people available to talk," Large said. The congregation rejoices in its opportunity to serve. "We get more out of this than we give."

Cleveland:

Last fall, Ooltewah UMC launched its website at www.ooltewahumc.org. Between Jan. 24 and Feb. 23, the site recorded 2,462 page accesses. People visited the site every hour of the day, even during midnight hours, the church newsletter reports. "It's exciting to see that people can turn to us 24 hours a day."

Chattanooga:

trip in just three weeks. For \$5, church members can buy Pink Cross/Pink Shield insurance, protecting their lawns from being "flocked" with the plastic birds. If they don't buy insurance, they pay \$10 to have them removed. If members remove the birds themselves, the fee is \$5. Both the congregation and youth are having fun with the fundraiser, says Director David Brackett. "It's sort of like rolling yards."




▲ TAZEWELL: A mission trip leads to marriage.
