



Small congregations, big prayers

Morristown-area churches use gifts to build outreach ministries

For both George Street and Grant's Chapel United Methodist churches, revitalization started with a group of people getting down on their knees and praying, "What do I have that you can use, Lord?"

That was the "easy part," says the Rev. Stephen Burkhart, grinning. "The hard part is, when God reveals it, will you do it?"

At the two Morristown District churches where Burkhart is pastor, the hard part seems to be coming along. Recent growth has helped George Street and Grant's Chapel be named this year's Mustard Seed Award winners for churches with fewer than 100 in average worship attendance.

Announced at Annual Conference in June, this is the first time two churches received the award at once, said the Rev. Pat Polis, chair of the conference's Small Membership Church Committee. "The committee voted to acknowledge the work

of a circuit whose churches obviously work in tandem with one another in their outreach ministries," he said.

George Street, located in Jefferson City, Tenn., and Grant's Chapel, in Dandridge, do have some similarities. Both have vital Wednesday programs, each reflecting their individual strengths. George Street, which averages about 75 in worship attendance, serves 40 to 50 children in a Wednesday after-school program. At Grant's Chapel, now averaging 95 in worship, Wednesday nights thrive with music and Bible study for all ages.

In fact, the church is known in the community for having an unusual amount of musical talent. Members recently bought a baby grand for the sanctuary.

"There are six to 12 piano players in that church," Burkhart said. "Three are members of traveling gospel groups. That See Small on page C3.

Training scheduled in Nashville Sept. 28

Tennessee-based clergy and lay leaders in the Holston Conference will receive letters this week informing them about an anti-gambling training event in Nashville Sept. 28-30, Director of Connectional Ministries Anne Travis said.

The letters ask ministers to attend the National Coalition Against Legalizing Gambling seminar in an effort to defeat a lottery proposal in the state's November 2002 election. The Memphis United Methodist Conference and Nashvillebased Tennessee Conference are also recruiting representatives to attend the interdenominational training, Travis said.

The Holston Annual Conference approved an anti-gambling resolution on June 13, 2001, urging members and the general public to vote against the lottery resolution next year.
